

When President Jefferson had concluded his speech, the following oath prescribed by the constitution was administered by Chief Justice Marshall.—“ I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States.”

He then retired, and repeated discharges of Artillery honored him as first Magistrate of the nation.

The Senate of the United States concurred unanimously in the appointments, of President Jefferson, mentioned in yesterday's Gazette. After which, a committee, consisting of Mr. Nicholas and Mr. Baldwin, were instructed to wait upon the President, to know whether he had any further communications to make. Having waited upon him, they made report that the President had no further communication to make.— Whereupon the Senate adjourned.

We understand that Mr Robert R. Livingston is not to proceed immediately to France, but that Mr. Dawson, a member of Congress from Virginia, is appointed to carry out the treaty, and in conjunction with Mr. Vans Murray, to negotiate the supplementary arrangements, which may be deemed necessary.

Mr. Livingston, who is appointed Plenipotentiary to the First Consul of France, was formerly Chancellor of New-York State.
